

Research

Substantiate Your Testimony

Use credible sources that are affiliated with local, state or federal government, or academic institutions. Make sure to cite your research, and when submitting email testimony, to <u>budgetcomments@aacounty.com</u>, **attach links or files** to your email. *Your Budget Toolkit includes almost 100 sources of data, planning documents and needs assessments to assist you in your research.*

The more specific, the better! **Recently published** documents, and **documents authored by County Departments and Agencies** will make for the most relevant sources.

Example 1:

I work for a non-profit that provides community health services. We currently provide free flu shots for 200 individuals per week. We are facing a steep decline in revenue due to the end of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding, that may jeopardize our ability to provide these services.

Example 2:

My street floods when it rains ever since a new development was built nearby on higher elevation.





Attend and/or host meetings around the topic of your testimony with other stakeholders to establish and strengthen a coalition of support.


Utilize community gathering spaces and organizations, as well as County Public Input Meetings



Draft your testimony via email and distribute it to community members with instructions on how to replicate your testimony and submit it.

Utilize community organizations, word of mouth, and social media to get the word out

Build a coalition of Anne Arundel residents and community members and encourage them to testify in person and/or by submitting written testimony online. Our County leaders and decision makers are looking for **trends among testimony to demonstrate a diverse coalition of support**. It's important that our Budget reflects the values and priorities of communities, and the county as a whole.



A consistent presence at the town halls and in County inboxes is the best way for a community to have its voice heard in the budget process



Dear Anne Arundel County Food Bank Friends and Supporters,

I hope that you had a very happy and joyful holiday season and that 2024 is off to a great start. At the Anne Arundel County Food Bank now is the time when we transition out of the holiday season into another very important time of year – County Budget season. I am writing today to request that you take action to help us secure funding from Anne Arundel County to support the essential work of the Food Bank.

Over the past four years, the pandemic-era, Federal funding made its way to Anne Arundel County and the Anne Arundel County Food Bank through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). We received an average of \$1.3 million each year to help maintain and expand our food purchases and distributions as well as support our warehouse operations. ARPA funding has been discontinued, but the high need for supplemental food resources in our community remains. Without support from the County, the Food Bank faces the possibility of a significant budgetary funding gap. With this in mind, we are making a specific request to the Office of the County Executive to invest \$1.5 Million of Fiscal Year 2025 County resources to support our County-wide food access efforts. Your advocacy on our behalf will go a long way towards ensuring that we can continue to serve our neighbors in need throughout Anne Arundel County, providing nourishing food and other essential resources when and where they are needed most.

One critical way that you can take action on behalf of the Anne Arundel County Food Bank is to attend one of the eight budget hearings and testify to the positive impact that the work of the Food Bank has on you, your immediate community, and/or the County as a whole. Hearings will take place in January and February 2024. <u>Identify</u> <u>your district</u> and <u>sign up to testify</u> at one of the budget listening sessions. If you prefer, you may also submit written testimony to <u>budget-</u> <u>comments@aacounty.org</u>.

Whether spoken or written, your words will send a powerful message that the work of the Anne Arundel County Food Bank serves a vital need, and that as a caring community we must invest our resources in the alleviation of food insecurity and the well-being of all our residents.

To assist you in the crafting of your message, below are several informational bullet points that may be helpful. Please feel free to personalize your message. Stories of lived experience can offer a particularly powerful perspective to our elected officials.

- According to the most recent ALICE Report, of the 212,687 Anne Arundel County households, 35% (74,440) are below the ALICE (Asset Limited Income Constrained Employed) threshold. Twenty-eight percent are, however, deemed to be above the federal poverty line and therefore may not qualify for federal assistance programs, including SNAP benefits.
- As a result of increasing housing costs, fluctuating food prices, and the end
 of the expanded Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, requests for
 emergency food assistance remain higher than they were before the
 pandemic and show no sign of abating.
- Currently, the Anne Arundel County Food Bank is providing an average of 48,000 instances of service every month.
- Nourishing food provided free of any charge ensures that families don't have to choose between eating and paying the rent, heating their homes, paying for prescription medicines, or any number of other survival essentials.
- Dedicated County funding for food access ensures that our under-resourced neighbors can access lean proteins and fresh produce as well as shelf-stable food items. Not only do these fresh, more nutritional food options help to determine better health outcomes, but also, they allow families to prepare meals that align with their cultural preferences and traditions.

Taking action together, we can ensure that all of our neighbors have access to the fundamental resources that they need to survive and thrive.

Edit and Review

Helpful questions to ask yourself before submitting testimony



Is the objective of my testimony clearly and concisely stated?

As County Executive, Steuart has pledged to make Anne Arundel County "The Best Place - For All," by "Putting Communities First." His strategy is to engage communities from every sector and to practice transparency and data-driven policymaking.



Does my testimony cite credible research or personal experiences?



Who stands to benefit from my testimony?



How feasible is my objective?

Is the objective of my testimony clearly and concisely stated?

Testimony will be analyzed in large part based on trends in categories and departments they fall under.

Example

If you're concerned about crime in your neighborhood, you might consider:

- General testimony, asking for public safety be prioritized and reflected in the investments of the budget based on recommendations by County Officials and subject matter experts
- Testifying to increase Public Safety Resources in your specific area
- Investments in Gun Violence Intervention, Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design
- Any specific programs or planning recommendations that you believe would help achieve the goal of crime reduction in your neighborhood

Most of the time, if there's an infrastructure issue or a community need, like a food dessert, those things will have been studied and documented. Budget testimony helps County decision makers gain a better and more specific understanding of where to put resources.



Example

Testimony regarding traffic improvements can be substantiated by County transportation plans and assessments, and publicly available accident data like VisionZero.

"There is a lens through which I view each request. First, it must improve delivery of a service to even be considered. If it does, I ask myself if it's a service that improves the quality of peoples' lives? How many lives? How much improvement? Is there an alternative way to deliver that same improvement? What is the impact on people if we don't fund the request?"

Who stands to benefit from my testimony?

All of the County's 600,000 residents have to be considered when making budgetary decisions. It is impossible to meet the needs or the asks of every resident and community, but initiatives that serve to help the most amount of people, and have the largest and most diverse demonstration of support, will be prioritized.

Example: "I would like the county to build a park in my neighborhood"

versus

"Myself and all of my neighbors who are here tonight would like the county to invest in a park in our neighborhood, which would benefit all 29,358 (ACS 2022) residents that live there."

How feasible is my objective?

Everything in the Budget is presented by the County Executive and approved by the County Council. It's helpful to keep in mind their policy goals and principles as guidelines for what they're likely to support



Look at similar projects or initiatives to gain a sense of the fiscal impact of your testimony

Anne Arundel County provides a multitude of services for its citizens in addition to maintaining equipment, buildings, and infrastructure. These have real costs that need to be considered in the budget process and adjusted as the needs of the county change.

Listed below are the average costs for a sampling of county services (these costs are estimates and include fringe benefits such as healthcare).
