Important Phone Numbers

911: For Emergencies that require immediate assistance from the police, fire department, or ambulance, please dial 911.

311: For non-emergency issues and neighborhood complaints, dial 311.

410-768-5522: 24/7 mental health and substance use disorder support.

1-800-485-0041: Call resource line for assistance with all basic needs including housing, food security, resources for parents and more.

202-201-3329 (Adult Detention): If you or someone you know is detained by ICE, the Amica Center for Immigrant Rights' has a detention line for Marylanders.

202-331-3320 (Children Under 18 Detention): If you or a child you know is detained by ICE, the Amica Center for Immigrant Rights has a detention line for Marylanders.

Safety

Call 911

It is important to report any incidents where you or your family feel threatened or have been the victim of a crime.

Anne Arundel County Police Officers take an oath to uphold the law and serve our communities with integrity, fairness, and respect. This commitment extends to all individuals, regardless of their immigration status. By prioritizing safety and justice for everyone, officers foster trust and cooperation within the community, ensuring that all individuals can seek help and report crimes without fear of discrimination or deportation. The Anne Arundel County Police Department reinforces the core values of public service and community trust that are essential for effective law enforcement.

Interacting with the Police

Anne Arundel County Police Department officers are not allowed to ask about your immigration status. Additionally, enforcement of civil federal immigration law falls exclusively within the authority of Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

If you are questioned by the police, you have the right to remain silent. If you are placed in police custody, you have the right to speak with an attorney before or during police questioning. Police officers should treat you with professionalism. You may file a complaint if you think that a police officer acted inappropriately while interacting with you to the <u>Police Accountability Board (PAB)</u>. Reporting Hate Crimes

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, a hate crime is generally motivated by bias against "race, color, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, or disability." The crime is often violent, such as "assault, murder, arson, vandalism, or threats to commit such crimes." If you or someone you know has been a victim of a hate crime, please report to:

- 1. Dial 911 to report to your state or local police.
- 2. Quickly follow up this report by reporting the crime to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Online at <u>tips.FBI.gov</u> or call 1-800-225-5324.

Avoiding Immigration Scams

When seeking assistance with you or your family's immigration case, **only seek legal help from qualified legal providers**. Organizations and representations that have been recognized and accredited can be found online at <u>justice.gov/eoir/recognition-accreditation-roster-reports</u> of the U.S. Department of Justice Executive Office for Immigration Review. You can verify your legal provider using American Immigration Lawyers Association's lawyer search at <u>ailalawyer.com</u>.

Do **NOT** contract immigration assistance from someone who identifies as a <u>notary</u>, <u>notario</u>, <u>licenciado</u>, <u>and visa consultant</u>. Make sure before providing any type of payment, you verify their legitimacy.

Family Preparedness

Guidelines for interacting with enforcement agents:

- Ask for an ID and to see a warrant. Both items can be shared through window or under door.
- You have the right to remain silent.
- You have the right to speak to a lawyer.
- If you are outside your home, ask the agent if you are free to leave and if they say
 yes, leave calmly.
- If you have a Know Your Rights card, give it to the agent. If you are inside of your home, show the card through the window or slide it under the door.

Family Preparedness Planning

- Find and contact an attorney or accredited representative.
- Register with your local consulate.
- If you've resided in the U.S. for longer than two years, consider carrying copies of
 evidence that prove two year residency such as mail to your home with a postmark, a
 signed lease, or school records.
- Make a family plan in a scenario that a family member were to be detained or deported.
 - If you have children under 18 years old, consider updating the Emergency Card Contact Information with Anne Arundel County Public Schools.
 - o Inform the person you would designate temporary guardianship, that they would need to contact the school systems Pupil Personal Worker of this hardship.
 - Make sure children born in the United States have passports.
 - Inform your children or family members of your family plan.
- Centralize and make copies of all immigration and important papers for all members of the family. Keep them in a safe place. Important papers:
 - Work authorization, copies of identification, passports, copies of immigration papers, birth certificates, marriage certificates, social security cards, attorney's contact information, medications family members take.
- Speak to an attorney about signing a power of attorney. A power of attorney will allow someone you trust to make decisions involving your finances, children, and other needs if you are detained or deported.
- Information you should memorize:
 - Your attorney's phone number
 - Your consulate's phone number
 - Your family's member phone numbers
